Print Reference Materials: Encyclopedias, Multivolume Works, Anthologies

Encyclopedia Author named (Author's name appears at the end of the article)	<p>Author. (last name, first—period) “Article Title.” (period-quotation marks) Title of Encyclopedia. (italic -period). Multiple publishers: if the title page lists two or more different publishers, include all of them, in the order given, putting a semicolon after the name of each but the last one.

Multiple locations: if the title page lists two or more different locations, use the first American City. Use the State when the city is not well known.

(period) If the title lists more than one publisher, include them all in the order given, putting a semicolon after the name of each but the last. For a Magazine or Newspaper

- Abbreviate the names of all months except May June and July
- Do not give the volume and issue numbers even if they are listed
- If an edition is listed on the masthead, add a comma after the date and specify the edition (e.g. natl., ed., late ed.)

Note: If you cannot find some information, cite as much as you can, but **you should always question the reliability of a source if too much information is missing.** The URL is optional but ALWAYS check with your teacher.

cited within your paper.

- Works Cited Page Checklist:**
- ✓ Double space throughout.
 - ✓ Entries are in alphabetical order by first word of the entry
 - ✓ **Do Not number entries**
 - ✓ If no author is listed, start entry with title ***Remembering to ignore *the, a, an* at the start of a title when alphabetizing.
 - ✓ First line of entry is aligned with the left margin
 - ✓ All subsequent lines are indented ½” or 5 spaces or use hanging indent format
 - ✓ Subsequent books by same author begin with 3 hyphens and a period to indicate a book by the same author
 - ✓ One inch margins
 - ✓ Typing guidelines:
 - 2 spaces after periods (.)
 - 1 space after commas (,)
 - 1 space after colons (:)

- Library Catalog Steps for Works Cited:**
1. Type book title in search box, click **title** button
 2. Click “**save to list**” link on right hand side of book details
 3. Click “**resource list**” on left hand side of catalog screen
 4. Click “**view**” next to My list
 5. Scroll down to the “**Create**” and choose “Citation list” click **go**
 6. Copy MLA works citations to a document.
